TESTS TO ORDER WHEN MEASLES IS SUSPECTED

- Virus detection by PCR (NP/throat swab AND urine) AND diagnostic serology (IgM and IgG)
 - <u>Measles Virus Detection by PCR</u>
 - <u>Nasopharyngeal swab (NP) OR throat swab obtained</u> 7 days of rash onset. Specimens should be collected using the Viral Transport Medium (VTM) (pink liquid medium) collection kit; AND
 - Urine: Minimum of 50 mL collected within 14 days of rash onset; AND
 - Diagnostic Serology:
 - A blood specimen (5 mL collected in a serum tube) for measles antibodies (IgM and IgG) should be collected at the first visit (ideally within 7 days of rash onset)
 - Diagnosis for a symptomatic patient requires testing by PCR
 - IgM serology should not be the only diagnostic test relied upon for the diagnosis of measles.

VACCINATION PATHWAYS

- Under the current provincial schedule for measles vaccination, specific populations are eligible for publicly-funded measles vaccines through various vaccination pathways.
- These populations can currently consult with and be served by Public Health or Primary Care Providers:
 - Children up to age 18 who are due or overdue for a measles-containing vaccination.

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- Infants aged 6 to 11 months who are travelling to a region with a high-risk of measles transmission. They can also seek vaccination through a Travel Medicine Clinic which may include fees.
- These populations are not currently served by Public Health. They are advised to consult with their Primary Care Provider:
 - Post-secondary student adults (18+) who have had one dose.
 - Adults (18+) who have had one dose and are travelling to a region with a high-risk of measles transmission. They can also seek vaccination through a Travel Medicine Clinic which may include fees.
 - **Military personnel and health care workers** who do not yet have 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine, regardless of year of birth (unless they can demonstrate immunity to measles).
 - Some immunocompromised individuals who require consultation before obtaining live vaccines.
 - **Any other adult** who requires consultation about eligibility for a publicly-funded measles-containing vaccination at this time.
- SWPH is exploring options to service adults (18+) who do not have a primary care provider. Details to follow.

INTERIM INFECTION PREVENTION AND CONTROL: MEASLES

- Technical brief: Interim IPAC recommendations and use of PPE for care of individuals with suspect or confirmed measles (Public Health Ontario).
- It recommends health care workers should wear a **fit-tested**, **seal-checked N95 respirator** (regardless of their presumed immune status) while providing care to individuals with suspect or confirmed measles.
- This has resulted in an update to the guide <u>Measles Information for Health Care Providers</u> (Public Health Ontario) related to IPAC best practices.
